Two one-day mini-seminars, for presentation in agencies that agree to co-host these powerful programs. In times of diminished tax revenue, AELE is able to bring these to your hometown at minimal cost. The programs are:

I - Use of Force: What every street officer needs to know

II - Review of Force: What management, supervisors and I-A need to know

Description:

I - Use of Force Mini-seminar

After a re-examination of the Constitutional standards and civil rights laws, the seminar focuses on managing confrontations, various interpretations of video-recorded incidents, and the drafting of use of force reports.

- Attendees will review videos of use of force incidents and prepare reports interpreting the events.
- Past reports will be examined for completeness and best practices.

II - Review of Force Mini-seminar

This program provides policymakers, management, supervisors, internal affairs investigators, and risk managers with the legal standards applicable to their positions, the tools to manage discipline, and a discussion of current trends in behavioral modification. Contents include:

- Analysis of use of force training techniques,
- Collection of evidence
- Implementing technology advances in use of force investigations
- Fitness For Duty Evaluations
- Behavioral modification

Tuition:

Each one-day program costs \$150 per attendant. Co-host agencies receive a limited number of tuition free attendants. Co-host agencies must provide a training room, LED projector and screen, a laptop connection cable(s) and nearby parking. Tuition includes a CD-ROM of court decisions, specimen use of force policies and resource materials.
